Good morning Vickie, as a reminder, you and I have met and discussed this issue in the past and in fact discussed you using my dock to observe wake surfing behavior on Gideons. The offer still stands, just let me know.

I wanted to include you on an email I just sent out to friends and neighbors to advise them of the upcoming meeting. Would you please include my email address on any notes the Lmcd puts out regarding this issue.

One issue I have not seen discussed is the amount of silt that is churned up by this wake surfing activity. Where the common docks have needed to dredge every 5-10 years before, it is now required every few years as the silt is pushed to shore. I actually have to take lake weeds back into the water to rid it of the amount of mud, otherwise they are too heavy to dispose of.

Also, we have not discussed the environmental impact of wake surfing. At a time of global warming and other recreation moving to clean energy like e-bikes and mountain biking this industry is taking an already highly inefficient gas guzzling machine and then driving it below planing speed, adding thousands of pounds of water to sink it further, adding wake gates, all to make it even more inefficient to produce ocean waves in a lake! It seems ludicrous to me that we embrace this activity while the world wrestles with trying to address climate change by switching to lower carbon activities. I imagine we can build a snow hill in the desert if we waste enough energy but that would be dumb, right?

Also, we need regulation, training is nice but as we all know, voluntary does not work if it is not in your personal interest. Examples include, only 5% of all plastic is recycled, even though we are well aware of the damage plastics do in the environment. Only 50% of boaters who trailer clean off their boats even though they know that this is what causes the transfer of invasive species. Folks do not even follow the 150 ft rule today, as the bay crowds, the boats operate closer and closer to shore. They know the rule but I hear, "well, there is no room out there, too many other surfers.

I plan to attend the meeting on June 8 but I'm not sure I'll get a chance to speak or have enough time to get my points in so wanted to share now with the Lmcd so you are aware that other issues besides what have been discussed exist.

Dear Friends and Neighbors on the lake,

I want to make you aware of an upcoming meeting that will be conducted by the LMCD on the impact of Wake surfing waves on Lake Minnetonka

# Community Room June 8<sup>th</sup> 5:00-7:00 pm

John Bendt who heads up Citizens for sharing Lake Minnetonka (CSLM) will also be presenting as part of the meeting. I have included below a letter John sent to the LMCD to help educate council members including results of studies completed around the country as well as here at the University of Minnesota and actions taken to reduce damage by extending the distance from shore and docks that wake surfers can operate. Other states including Wisconsin counties have either banned wake surfing in less than 30 ft of water or extended the operating length to 700-1000 ft from shore. As the technology improves these boats can produce waves of up to 4 ft. in which the wave energy goes up exponentially.

Personally, we have experienced our rip rap become severely compromised while incurring damage to both our Skiff and jet ski platform. Other neighbors I have talked with have also incurred damage. I know the education program states "own your wake" but given the large number of boats operating in the bay at any one time, the density pushed the boats closer and closer to the docks.

I am not against wake surfing, I believe though from the studies and personal experience that wake surfing needs to be operated at least 700 ft from docks or shore and needs to be operated in depths greater than 30 ft which excludes the majority of Gideons bay leaving only the east end. Currently with wake surfing boats operating in the bay at shallower depths, the sport is churning up the bottom and pushing the silt along with lake weeds into the shore creating the need to now dredge which is a very high cost. There is plenty of large lake area to accommodate this activity without interfering with other boating and water activities or doing damage to the environment.

The wake surfing association is trying to push for a 200 ft limit based on old "industry" studies. The current research disputes this, especially with the new technology increasing wave heights with wake gates and excessive weight loading.

So, if you agree and would like to see some regulation/discussion regarding this activity (distance from shore, depth, time of operation, noise level) I request that you attend the meeting to help the LMCD work to find an workable solution.

Subject: No-Wake Zone Distance From Shore

Dear LMCD Board Directors;

WSIA continues to advocate a 200 ft no-wake setback from shore and docks for wakesurfing, based on their 2015 study

entitled, "Characterization of Wake-Sport Waves, And Their Potential Impact on Shorelines." I expect the boating industry and wakesurfing advocates will recommend 200 ft is the proper setback distance, when they have an opportunity to speak to you during your formal hearing process. I would like to offer the following thoughts for your consideration.

1. The purpose of a no-wake zone is the need to protect shorelines, docks, moored watercraft, swimmers, anglers, etc. from wave energy.

2

3. The formula used in the St Anthony Falls Lab Study to calculate wave energy includes the following factors: **Water Density, Wave Height Squared, and Wave Length.** Clifford Goudey, the WSIA consultant, also used this formula in his calculations for the 2015 WISA Study.

4

5. **Wave height** is the heaviest weighted factor in the formula, hence the WSIA consultant, Clifford Goudey, stated a good rule of thumb measure of wave energy is wave height squared.

- 7. The following studies CSLM has read also calculated wave energy using the same formula.
- Boat Wake Impacts Lake Rabun & Lake Burton, Georgia by Water Environment Consultants, Mount Pleasant, S.C
- Characteristics of Recreational Boat Wakes by Robert Shuster, A Thesis Submitted To University of Alabama.
- Review of Boat Wake Waves Inmpacts On Shoreline Erosion, And Potential Soultions For Chesapeak Bay, STAC. Review Report Fall 2016, Published in William & Mary Scholar Works.
- A review of a report on the potential impact of intentional waves from power boats, as commissioned by the Water Sports Industry Association, and the WISA summary of that report. By Edward B. Swain, Ph.D, Independent Scientist, Ph.D in Ecology (University of Minnesota, 1984) Published February 16, 2020.

The purpose of the above discussion is to demonstrate there is no scientific disagreement on how to calculate wave energy, and that wave height is the most significant factor in creating wave energy.

Given this fact, logic demands this conclusion: **The higher the wave, the more energy it contains. And the increase in energy is not linear.** For example, using the wave height squared rule of thumb, a 4 ft wave contains 4 times more energy than a 2 ft wave. (2 squared = 4) (4 squared = 16).

Question? How does the WSIA claim 200 ft is the correct setback from shore and docks for wakesurfing stand up to this logic? The wave height tested in their 2015 study was 27 inches, and today's wakesurf boats can create waves that are significantly higher. For example, a wave height of 39 inches generated by a Malibout MXZ was tested in the St Anthony Falls Lab Study. This wave has twice the energy of the 27inch wave according to the wave height squared rule of thumb method of calculating wave energy. So, is it logical to claim a wave with twice the wave energy will have the same impact on shore and docks at 200 ft as the lower energy wave?

The link below shows today's wakesurf boats are capable of creating waves in excess of 4 ft. Using the same rule of thumb, these waves pack four times more energy than the 27 inch wave tested in the WSIA 2015 study. The basis of competition for wakesurfing boats is the height and shape of the wave they create. This most likely will drive technology to create even bigger, more perfectly shaped waves in the future.

CSLM believes a logical conclusion is a 200 ft setback provides inadequate protection against wave energy for these size waves. The St Anthony Falls Lab research found the operational distance required by wakesurf boats to attenuate their wave energy to a non-wakesurf boat planning at an operational distance of 200 ft from shore was greater than 575 ft. The study also found a distance greater than 600 ft was required to attenuate wakesurf boat's wave power. We, therefore, conclude it is reasonable to prohibit wakesurfing within 700 ft from shore or docks and request LMCD pass an ordinance requiring this distance for the coming boating season.

As you know, the Greenwood city council has not taken a position regarding wake surfing, but I want to share my personal opinion with you as a resident ...



Wake Surfing on Minnetonka

To Whom it may concern,

As an avid boater for more than 20 years, using Lake Minnetonka multiple times a year, a ban on Wake surfing is a ridiculous idea. If the intent is to placate owners who are complaining about shore erosion or other boaters in the area, then the solution should start with the LARGEST boats on the lake. There are literally thousands of boats in the Yacht class moored on the lake, weighing 10,000 pounds, drafting 3-4 feet or more and LOA's of 35+ feet.

The wake produced at even 15 miles an hour by yachts of this class can easily exceed 4-5 feet from the trough to the peak of the wave, and I can tell you, the behavior of many of these boat owners is horrible. Having a 21 foot wake boat with a freeboard of only 24 inches off the water, I have to dodge their wakes every time or risk being capsized.

On more than one occasion, including coming out of a no wake zone near the sailing club a 40 foot cruiser went to full throttle 50 feet away from me while we were going 5mph. There was no way I could get the bow of my boat up fast enough to avoid his wake and I took at least 100 gallons of water over the bow. did he stop? NO. This is a terrifying thing to happen to small boat owners and it happens multiple times a day on every weekend on that lake.

Blaming issues on wake boats and surfers is a joke.

THE BIGGEST wave these boats produce are maybe 3 feet from trough to peak and that's the 25foot wake with 3,000 of ballast on board. MOST wakeboats on Minnetonka are between 21-23 feet and weigh in fully loaded around 6-7,000 lbs.

Maximum speed surfing is 12 MPH and there's only one wave- not multiple rollers like the ones thrown from 35 plus foot-yacht-class boats.

Wake boats are a premium boat owned my people that use services on the lake including restaurants, marinas, and boat suppliers that help the economy.

If you're looking to restrict wakes, please look to limiting the days that a yacht class boat can use the lake- this would allow smaller boats to use the water farther from shore and eliminate any issues related to wakes/ erosion or just general irritation.

I personally only use Minnetonka during the week as the chaos on the weekends is too much to put my family through, dealing with too many large boats run by people with no appropriate training.

Mentioning training, most wake boarder/ surf boat owners are well versed in appropriate driving, managing distances from shore and protecting their riders first and foremost- this can't be said for larger boat owners in general who are usually cruising around "booze-cruising" and not paying attention to the waterways and their users.

Please think about your decision carefully.

We want to make you all aware of some very concerning developments we're seeing in the efforts to restrict and regulate the use of wake surf boats and wake surfing on Minnesota Lakes. As you are all probably aware, there have been some small activist groups that have popped up over the last few years working to restrict and regulate use of wake surf boats on Minnesota Lakes. Much of this is happening at the local Lake Association level, and many times, we find homeowners are unaware and surprised to find their Lake Associations are indulging these efforts to restrict their use of the lake. These activist efforts are getting serious for Lake Minnetonka, as the LMCD, who governs Lake Minnetonka, has decided to take up the issue of evaluating restricting and regulating wake surfing, after Boater Safety legislation recently failed in the MN State Legislature. While we support what many Lake Associations, including the LMCD, do to help with buoys, docks, AIS, boater education, Water Patrol, and other environmental matters to help preserve and protect our lakes, many are leaning into uncharted territory entertaining these new 'anti-wake' agendas. We do not support Lake Associations creating onerous restrictions on wake surfing and the use of wake surf boats on Minnesota Lakes. We strongly support the WSIA, Wake Responsibility Campaign, with 200 foot setbacks for wake surfing, keeping music at reasonable levels, and minimizing repetitive passes while wake surfing.

While many of you don't use Lake Minnetonka, this still VERY MUCH affects you. If the LMCD, governing Lake Minnetonka, is able to create restrictions and regulations around the use of Wake Surf Boats, other smaller Lake Associations will use this as a basis for enacting their own restrictions. On many lakes, should an onerous setback back be adopted for wake surfing, it could effectively ban wake surfing on many smaller lakes that

couldn't meet setback requirements.

The Lake Minnetonka Conservation District (LMCD) will be holding a public

listening session on wakes/wake surfing next Wednesday, June 8th from

5:00PM – 7:00PM at Wayzata City Hall. Full details are in this document

from the LMCD outlining the meeting. We apologize for the short notice but

The people calling for these bans are the same people that dislike jet skis, speed boats, large boats, water skiers etc. They are calling for these bans under the guise of shoreline erosion etc. They are the same people that want to ban activities they don't participate in or do not like.

Reality is that many boats create waves equal to or larger than surf boats. Surf boats are 20-25 feet long. They have ballast to increase weight to "enhance" the wave. They have the ability to shape the wave.

- The waves are not any larger than any boat larger than 25 feet. Any cabin cruiser will create huge waves
- Any boat 23 feet or larger, such as a Cobalt or Chaparral bowrider, where the operator cruises the shoreline at 1/4 throttle creates a large wave similar to a surf wave
- I used to water ski. Once towables came along I had to water ski early in the morning or late at night because the boats with towables drive in circles for hours on end creating waves. Were they banned? Are they allowed to tow only between certain hours? No. I figured out how to coexist.

Are you going to limit or ban jet skiers? Boats >25 feet? Speed boats with above water exhaust that are loud? People driving their boats at 1/4 throttle and not attempting to plane the boat out? Boats going over a certain speed?

Every boater needs etiquette, understand safe operation of their boat and be courteous and aware of other boaters and lake shore owners. Singling out and banning or limiting/regulating any one group over another is wrong.

regulations around the use of wake surf boats.

I'm writing in opposition to restricting and/or prohibiting wake surfing on Lake Minnetonka and other area lakes. I have found that wake surfing is a wonderful activity for people of all ages to enjoy. The slow speed makes it safer from injuries and I think navigating around the lake as well. In contrast, if you have multiple boats pulling tubes, wakeboarder, and skiers at 20-35mph (versus 10mph with wake surfing), it can quickly eat up space on the lake and leads to potentially more incidents.

As for larger waves being created, I think most surfers try to stay in the deeper water because it just works better. If a dock is so low to the water that a wave might wash up over the top of it, it should probably be raised up a bit to eliminate the issue. For waves hitting the shore, the rip rap seems to handle waves of all sizes and I haven't found it to be an issue.

I'm a boat owner, a lake home owner, fisherman, and a watersports enthusiast writing in the hopes that you do not impose additional restrictions and regulations around the use of Wake Surf Boats on Lake Minnetonka or any of the other Minnesota lakes. Please don't let the voices of a small few, limit the enjoyment of the majority of lake users.

LMCD Wake Impact Listening Session

Hello. I'm writing these comments as I will not be able to attend the LMCD boat wake listening session on June 8, 2022.

First, thank you for approaching this issue. It is an emotional and potentially divisive issue but needs to be addressed. I hope that those presenting at the hearing session speak respectfully and with facts or personal experiences in hand.

I live in Shorewood (6030 Ridge Road) but not on Lake Minnetonka. I live on Christmas Lake though, and see an increasing number of larger and more powerful boats using Christmas Lake, and many by people who have very little idea of how to drive a boat, the impact their boat and its wake has on other users of the lake, the shoreline and lake bottom, or on lakeshore improvements. I would imagine the same is true of Lake Minnetonka.

Here are my main comments.

#### Be Guided by Good Science

Any regulation of boats that intentionally creating large wakes should be based as much as possible on science. The UofM St. Anthony Falls Hydrology Lab's study, published in the fall of 2021, is probably the best science so far on this issue. The same lab will hopefully be continuing its study of boat wakes and the impact of propeller thrust on lake bottoms this boating season. I know you are aware of this study, and its conclusion that for wakesurf boat wakes to have the same impact on share as more typical boats the wakesurf boat needs to operate at a distance of greater than 500 feet from shore. Many say 500 feet. That is not what the study says. It says greater than 500 feet.

#### 2. Avoid Bad "Science"

Some may say that 200' is sufficient. To the extent they base this number on science, they are referring to a discredited 2015 "study" (to be generous) in Florida which was funded, designed and promoted by the Water Sports Industry Association (WSIA). They have not released their procedures, work product or underlying data. The "study" was not peer reviewed. It therefore cannot withstand any scrutiny. I also know from personal experience that wakesurf boats 200' from shore produce waves that run over the top of my dock. I have never seen another boat do that on my dock.

#### 3. Multiple Passes

I agree with the idea that a boat producing large waves should not make multiple passes in front of the same shoreline. In smaller bays and lakes however we see one boat taking several passes, shortly followed by another. So this guidance may help, but on busy days does not always result in the shoreline getting a rest.

#### 4. Lake Wakes Consume Can Consume a Bay or Lake to the Exclusion of Others

Boats producing large wakes tend to consume a huge area of water. On Christmas Lake, and I imagine on bays on Lake Minnetonka, when a wakesurf boat comes out, SUP paddlers, water skiers and others leave the lake, and fishing boats get tossed about. These huge waves are, simply, incompatible with nearly every other use of the lake, no matter how courteous or responsible the driver. I don't think wakesurf boat operators understand this. The only way for boats producing huge wakes to share a relatively smaller body of water (yet one which allows them to remain a significant distance from shore) may be for them to have limited operational hours.

#### 5. Wakesurfing Does Not Enjoy Majority Appeal

I have seen a recent appeal from a nearby boat dealer that talks about those that don't support wakesurfing as a "minority" and those that oppose unrestricted wakesurfing as a minority of "activists." The activist label is a bit of demagoguery, which is unfortunate, but it and the "minority" label are also just not true. Wakesurf boats are no doubt becoming more and more popular, but in talking with those that use lakes, just about anyone who doesn't own and operate a wakesurf boat thinks they need to be regulated to minimize damage to our lakes and lakeshores, and to allow others to use our lakes as well. Let's call these "traditional" lake users and lakeshore owners. No matter how you do the counting, these traditional users and lakeshore owners far outnumber wakesurf boat owners and users. The Minnesota DNR sells about 1 million fishing licenses a year. A few fishermen may also own wakesurf boats. But ask any other fisherman about boats throwing up huge wakes for hours on end and I think you'll find few supporters. Wakesurfers are the minority, and at \$150,000 plus for a wakesurf boat, they always will be.

## 6. Safety on the Water

I'm also concerned about safety with wakesurf boats. They operate in a very "bow up" plowing position so it is more difficult for the driver to see forward of the boat. And everyone in the boats is having fun and looking back and talking with the surfer, oftentimes including the driver. Two summers ago on Christmas Lake we had a wakeboard boat in such a position with the driver paying inadequate attention to where they were going and they ran right over a tandem kayak. Luckily the couple in the kayak were not seriously hurt as they dove out of the kayak just before the boat it. Their kayak was seriously damaged. Wakesurf drivers need to know not only what their wake is doing and how far they are from shore, but know at all times what is in front of them.

I understand you are collecting opinions regarding wake surf boats. Last year, my family decided to purchase a wake surf boat, after enjoying time with our friends that had one. These boats, when used responsibility, are a great joy for us, and others. To surf successfully, the boats need to be driven about 10-11 mph, so they are much slower than waterski boats. Also, since the "surfer" is typically detached from the boat (no rope), we have to drive with extreme care to ensure we avoid other boaters -- this adds to the overall safety of the lake. We have stopped a few times to instruct jet skiers that they should not follow any boat, especially wake boats, as they could easily hit a fallen skier.

We have 2 boys (13 and 15) and this boat has given us a great bonding opportunity as a family. We also ensure our music is quiet, and that we don't stay in one area too long. Additionally, the sport can be tiring, so we are wake boarding for no longer than 1 hour total, for all 3 of us riders to have a good time. We also stay far from shore, both to ensure waves don't travel and contribute to erosion or damage to docked boats, but also for our safety and that of the boat. Wake boats are inboard motors, and need to be in proper depth, so it is beneficial for us to stay away from the shore for those reason.

Hello -

My name is Nick Culotti – I have lived on Lake Minnetonka since 2014. I've read numerous articles about the concern of wake surfing boats on Lake Minnetonka. I'm writing to you to provide my point of view and <a href="support of Wake Surfing">support of Wake Surfing</a> and Not regulating the activity on Lake Minnetonka. Today, I received an email letting me know there would be a LMCD meeting holding a public hearing regarding the topic.

- 1. I think the Lake Minnetonka residential lake shore owners should all be made aware there is a public hearing being held. I was never email or sent a notice via mail. One of the biggest arguments against wake surfing is the lake shore erosion. Homeowners should all be made aware of this hearing. I feel the failure to proactively reach lake shore owners is not doing the public justice, especially as they are being used as the primary reason for restrictions. Their voices need to be heard, not just environmental activists in the community.
- 2. Has the LMCD completed a study to measure the linear footage of lake shore with Rip Rap vs. natural vegetation? I would argue over 60% of homeowners on Lake Minnetonka have Rip Rap vs. natural vegetation. For example, Wayzata Bay almost all homeowners have Rip Rap. The UMN study is not factoring in lake shore owners having Rip Rap vs. natural vegetation which is more vulnerable to wave energy.
- 3. I feel the UMN study has many variables not accounted for by the University of Minnesota:
  - a. What is the impact of waves on shoreline with rip rap vs. natural shoreline.
  - b. What percentage of Lake Minnetonka homeowners have rip rap vs. natural shorelines?
  - c. Wake Surfing boats are not the only boat that can create larger than normal waves, boats over 30 ft long traveling at 15 MPH or greater create significant waves which would create similar impacts and impede kayaking and paddle boarding and increase wave travel.
  - d. The researcher even states they need to do more research quote from MN Post "Jill Sims, manager of Great Lakes policy and engagement for the National Marine Manufacturers Association, said the research shouldn't be used as justification for a large 500-foot or more setback requirement, especially considering it didn't measure how wakesurfing waves actually impact shorelines when operated 200 feet away." source MINNPOST
- 4. The argument that the public cannot paddle board or kayak due to Wake Surfing boats is misplaced and misleading. Lake Minnetonka has become very congested and popular with boats of all shapes and sizes which all create waves. All these waves impact kayaking and paddle boarding. To place the blame only on Wake Surfing boats is unjustified. The larger issue needs to be addressed, boating activity has increased significantly over the years and size of boats as well.
- 5. Limiting the hours and parts of Lake Minnetonka in which a boater can WakeSurf is **unjust** as it places priority on other lake activities. The LMCD should not create these restrictions. It would only be fair then to limit the hours all activities can be conducted, such as hours of operation and location of a larger vessel, sail boats, jet skis, fishing, paddle boards, kayaks on Lake Minnetonka. Or take it even further only lake shore owners should be allowed to use the Lake. None of these restrictions would make sense, equal and equitable use of the lake is only obtained by not regulating water crafter activities.

6. Safety of other boaters due to Wakesurfing is misplaced. I believe there are more serious safety issues on Lake Minnetonka than Wake Surfing waves. The lack of wearing life jackets, alcohol related incidents and unsafe driving due to lack of boater safety knowledge. Boater safety should be implemented as part of registration and operation of any watercraft in Minnesota. Everyone needs to pass a test for a driver's license for a motor vehicle, the same should be true for boater safety and boats. This would force the education on water safety, boater etiquette, rules, and regulations.

Greetings LMCD and to those whom it may concern,

My name is Dan Malone and I am a resident of Shorewood and active user of Lake Minnetonka and other area lakes in the west metro. We trailer our boat and launch 2-3 times per week throughout the spring, summer and fall months. We own a 21' direct drive ski boat (old school ski boat) and partake in all the water activities from skiing, wakeboarding, cruising, swimming, and shoreline meandering.

There is a lot of discussion related to wake boats, waves, music, shoreline erosion and how busy the Lake Minnetonka boating scene is these days. Over the past 5 years of boating on the lake, the most extreme uncomfortable situations we have been put in are directly related to the wind and waves that come about when storms roll in or needing to go across a windy bay. No other boat comes close to what the wind produced waves create on Lake Minnetonka, even considering the 30-50' boats that frequent Lake Minnetonka. We do see a lot of families in newer wake boats on the lake, both surfing and anchored up enjoying the lake lifestyle. I have noticed certain scenarios in which I would like to see better educated drivers on the lake, to enhance safety and enhance overall enjoyment for all boaters and lake users (all types of boats, not just one type of boat).

Our family is NOT in support of trying to regulate certain type(s) of boats or recreation activities on Lake Minnetonka. We understand this is the busiest lake in the state, and understand education and being friendly to other boaters goes a long way to improving safety and everyone's enjoyment of the lake lifestyle here in Minnesota. The LMCD should not impose wake restrictions for distances from shore, or from certain types of recreation activities. Who is going to impose these regulations? Is over-regulation a slippery slope for future regulation which is not needed? Are boat waves more impactful on shorelines than 8 months/year of wind waves? These questions should be highly considered throughout the discussion, I believe.

Another area of concern for myself is the discussion of shoreline erosion due to waves. 100-200 years ago Minnesota lakes were lined shorelines of cat tails, bog, swamp, rocks, and natural shoreline materials. With the development of private property, home owners have stripped the shoreline of these natural elements that inherently prevent erosion, to enhance the 'look & appeal' of their shoreline. Only to complain of eroding shoreline due to waves. In my opinion, this discussion should be a common sense understanding that boat wakes and wind generated waves all create disturbances along shorelines, but it is ourselves eroding the shorelines due to our need for fancy sand beaches, pristine lakefront properties, and immaculate estates that lead to enhanced erosion.

Thank you for allowing these comments to be heard, and appreciate what your team at the LMCD does to help us all enjoy Lake Minnetonka. Both now and for the future of all boaters.

I am a homeowner on Lake Minnetonka, and I strongly oppose the uninformed regulation of boat generated wakes. As a steward of our lakeshore, I have not observed any noticeable shoreline degradation or riparian environmental effects from boat wake. Most of the shoreline degradation I observe is caused by fellow homeowners irresponsibly causing runoff of excessive fertilization.

Proponents of wake regulation argue under the guise of environmental protection, however their true interest is to limit competing recreational uses of the lake, recreational uses that they view as incompatible with their preferred recreational experience. I strongly urge the conservation district to rely on scientific facts rather than the loud voices of selfish individuals.

I do support scientifically informed regulation of boat generated wakes. The recent UMN study is a step in the right direction toward informed regulation, however it fails to measure the environmental effects of boat generated wake and is limited to the measurement of contrasts in the dissipation of wake energies across boat types. Further scientific study is needed on the *environmental effects* of wake generating boats before any wholesale regulation is imposed that limits recreational use and enjoyment of the lake.

## Dear LMCD Board Members,

Thank you for holding the listening session regarding boat generated wake impacts. My name is Sheri Wallace. I live on Harrisons Bay in Mound and am also the president of the recently formed Harrisons Bay Association. Harrisons Bay is a shallow bay and is on the Impaired Waters List published by the MPCA.

We have spent the last year holding neighborhood meetings to understand the concerns of the residents. It is these concerns and love for our bay, that lead to us creating the Harrisons Bay Association. Two weeks ago we held our association kickoff at Back Channel Brewing. We were thrilled that roughly 200 neighbors showed up. Our mission as an association is to maintain, protect, and improve the water quality, aesthetics, wildlife habitat, fishery, and recreational capacity of the bay and have some fun while we do it!

Based on the current research by the University of Minnesota it appears that the current 150 feet ordinance is not appropriate to protect lakeshore, boats, docks and non-motorized recreation. Our bay is very narrow and shallow. We would encourage you to heed the results of this research and increase the distance required from shore and boats when creating a wake. Additionally due to the shallowness of our bay we are concerned that wake surfing boats are releasing large amounts of phosphorus from the bottom of the bay. After a weekend of boat use our bay is murky and the algae blooms have become more frequent with the appearance of dangerous blue algae. It is our hope that LMCD will partner with the U of MN to understand not only the distance from shore required but also the depth of water needed to safely maintain our water quality. Defining acceptable wake boat areas within Lake Minnetonka bays will help us to protect the lake.

The Harrisons Bay Association board will be working over the next several months to define our associations priorities and collect the voices of our over 225 lakeshore property owners. We would be happy to share specific information as it is gathered. We appreciate the support LMCD has provided to us in treating our AIS this year. We look forward to working together with LMCD in taking care of this wonderful lake, and the people who love it.

I would to voice my opinion both as a lakeshore homeowner and the owner of a Malibu wakeboarding boat since 2005. I live on a small bay, Priest's Bay, but taught my kids wakeboarding in the 00's before we moved onto the lake. During those years we always tried to stay on large bodies of water as I was trying to respect the homeowners as much as possible. This was before surfing became the rage and the wakes were not nearly what they are today.

While I respect the sport of wake surfing, it wreaks havoc on shorelines and docks especially on small bay like ours where there is not enough space between boat and shore for the giant waves to dissipate their energy. And the loud rap music that is played is very really rude to home owners. That point is not debatable. It is very frustrating to sit on your dock on a nice calm evening, only to have that peace pierced the sounds of offensive music and rolling 2 foot waves rocking the dock sections.

## I would offer two compromise options:

- 1. Restrict wake surfing (or better yet all wakes) to certain bays on a rotational basis. Dear Boar Members,

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments regarding the impact of wave boats and large cruisers on the use and enjoyment of Lake Minnetonka.

I am a resident of Minnetonka but I do not have a home located on the lakeshore. However, I am an avid fisherman with a fishing boat stored at a marina in West Arm Bay. I spend hundreds of hours on the lake each year fishing the bays, channels and main lake structures. Over the years I've witnessed the environmental impact of many culprits.

Soil erosion from the lack of a buffer zone, power boats, aquatic plant removal/spraying, man-made cribs and other unnatural uses have a detrimental effect on the ecology of the lake. But I've noticed the erosion has become more acute in the era of wake boats. As I said above, wake boats are not the only culprit but are most certainly part of the problem. The plant life, bottom structure and contents are changing and the fish are suffering. Spawning beds are destroyed before fry are developed. Bottom structure provides seasonal and daily migratory routes for fish to move up for feeding. As the bottom structure erodes and changes, these migratory routes get blocked and the fish stop using them.

Lake Minnetonka historically was one of the best fishing lakes in the Midwest; bringing dollars and economic boom to the area. Fishing was the #1 reason for visitors to the area. Along the way the lake became a place to develop expensive homes, marinas and restaurants. The shift from a fishing lake to a recreational lake has created an imbalance and the fishing has been disproportionately effected.

There should be a balance between the use of the lake for all competing stakeholders (homeowners, retail, recreation and fishing). I suggest a few common sense proposals:

- 1. Limit the use of wake boats and large cruisers to an area of the lake at least 500' from shore.
- 2. Require an adequate buffer zone around the entire perimeter of the lake.
- 3. Consider making all small bays "no-wake" zones.
- 4. Require a no-wake zone 500' from shore on the entire lake from ice-out until after the spring spawning season.

I am a Mound resident on North Arm Bay and have been on and around lakes all over the country all my life.

I understand the desire by a few to blame wake surfing for issues on the water, because of the expensive, flashy, and often loud boats typically associated with this activity; however, of all the lakes I've been around I've never experienced the overall level of boater incompetence and selfishness that I've experienced on Lake Minnetonka.

It is not the fault of one type of boat or boater. I've witnessed fisherman cause an accident at the North Arm Launch due to sheer refusal to wait in line for their turn. I've witnessed drivers of large vessels push smaller boats into the walls on channels because they did not want to wait their turn. I've seen jet skiers cause confusion and perilous situations around channels trying to catch large air. I've been cut off by fishermen (while towing a skier) who drive their boats as if the fish might escape the lake. Not to mention the numerous accidents at various boat ramps and channels around the lake over the last two years.

It astonishes me that a boater safety course is not required to register a boat in this state. It is despicable to me the overall level of disrespect most boaters have for swimmers, paddle boarders, kayakers, skiers, wakeboarders, wake surfers, sailors, (really anyone in the water without a motor).

It is clear most boaters do not know, understand, or care about the standard right of ways or standard boat safety.

The specific complaints against wake surfing are a symptom of a much larger problem. Please focus on the actual problem, which is boater incompetence. The focus should be to maintain safe and fair access to the water for all boaters and more importantly all people who are on the water.

I have been an avid boater on the Lake Minnetonka chain for the last several years and I have also seen the added scrutiny of a small group of people in regards to waves generated by surfing. I find it a little ironic that wake boats are specifically targeted and there is little to no mention of the large cruiser boats that create an even larger wake and have stereos twice as loud cruising along the shore lines. In addition if you go out on the lake anytime after 10am it's constant chop / waves regardless of what type of watercraft is operating. ### Good Morning,

As a reasonable person, I always try to step back and consider debates from both sides. I am a Lake Minnetonka lakeshore owner (2600 West Lafayette Rd) and I don't want any boat buzzing my dock at close distance either. And I can understand excessive noise concerns, we often have cruiser party boats coming by at 2am. But I am not suggesting all cruiser boats be banned or further regulated. I apply common sense and recognize that not all cruisers are violators of the rules. Therefore I support the EXISTING ordinances that already address distance and noise. I support ticketing the violators but not further restricting the those who follow the rules.

I'm not sure where to start in addressing the proposal to limit wakesurfing on certain bays and restrict times. For starters, again, applying common sense, this would only cause excessive congestion during allowed times/bays. This is the equivalent of suggesting a solution of only driving on 394 from noon until 4P due to some bad drivers. This would never happen- we just ticket the violators who don't follow the rules rather than penalize all.

There is reference made to wakesurf wakes harming shoreline in reference to the UofM study. Again, this argument does not stand as A) It is one study and there are others that show wave dissipation rates are more than adequate to preserve shoreline; B) The study did not include any other make of boat including large cruiser boats waves which generate FAR MORE ENERGY than any wake boat. All boats should maintain current regulated distance from shore and other boats. We have lived on Lake Minnetonka for years and our shoreline has been fine from all wakes, however, it was decimated this spring by an aggressive ice out.

It is my opinion that this restrictive agenda is being pushed by a few who are more concerned about their personal agendas without considering others. It is suspicious that they live on the bays they'd like restricted for wakesurfing but when approached about driving their larger cruiser boats at speed, they have full intentions to do so. They also mention sharing the lake with SUPs and kayaks. I participate in these activities also and have no problem doing so. Again, I apply common sense and don't venture out on a Saturday afternoon in main bays but I have done so during this time inside shallow water buoy markers or during the week.

Now on the subject of wakesurfing: What an amazing family sport. It's slow, everyone can participate, kids are off their phones and invested in quality family time. I spend a lot of my summer educating new boat owners on wakesurf driving etiquette, safety, etc. They are respectful and follow the rules. Our family loves to wakesurf together. We respect the current rules and regulations and have never had a complaint about our operation.

I likely spend more time on the water than most people do. I see it all. I would suggest maintaining and enforcing the current ordinances and let the deputies focus on safety. I have had scary experiences on the lake. One involving my son (7yo at the time) who was almost run over by a rental pontoon full of people not paying attention. This was a Monday afternoon and we were the only tow boats operating in North Arm. Another involving a jet ski that was following too close and didn't see me fall. I yelled and held up my board but ended up needing to swim down. The jet ski turned, soaked our boat, ejected himself and the passenger, and when I surfaced I was directly under the jet ski. Another was when I was pulling my other young son waterskiing. My mom was in the boat with me and other young kids. I saw a runabout coming pulling a tuber and the driver was looking back at the tuber. I started yelling and honking but in the end had to make the decision to cut the throttle and brace for impact hoping he would hit our boat and not my son in the water. He saw us at the last moment and cranked the wheel sending his tubers into the side of our boat. Terrifying!!! I ONLY pull my kids until 10am for any watersport on the weekend on Lake Minnetonka and we anchor and swim next to the boat anytime after. We need to focus our attention on having ALL water vessels maintain alertness and proper distance from shore, docks and other vessels rather than further debate wake boats. Safety should be the focus!!!!!

In closing, I support safe and respectful operation of all watercrafts. I encourage boater education and support citations for distance and noise violations. The lake has always been my favorite place. I would love to see everyone be respectful so we can enjoy this blessing together.

#### Dear LMCD and LMCD Board:

I and my wife Christine Lindblad were made aware of the Listening Session related to boat wakes and boating access to be held this evening at Wayzata City Hall, and wanted to share some perspectives and thoughts as long-time lake shore owners and boat operators on Lake Minnetonka.

We and our family have been Lake Minnetonka residents for over twelve years, and have spent time on the lake for much longer than that. For two years we lived on the western part of the lake, on Hardscrabble Point, and for the remainder have lived in Tonka Bay on Lafayette Bay.

For the first eleven years, we owned and operated a 33 foot Sea Ray SLX and last year moved to a Malibu LSV. During our years as lake shore owners and Lake Minnetonka boat operators, we have had the chance to enjoy all that Lake Minnetonka has to offer, and have seen and experienced some of the challenges related to Lake Minnetonka's size, popularity and the changing styles of boats and watercraft recreation. For the most part, we have enjoyed and observed appropriate, respectful, friendly and conscientious watercraft operation on the part of individuals and families operating all kinds of watercraft, including wake boats. In fact, in the time wake surfing and wake surf-specific boats rose in popularity, we enjoyed watching this interesting and new (to us) activity, and found most of those boats and boat operators to be careful, conscientious and respectful of shoreline, shoreline owners enjoying the water near their docks, and other watercraft, either under power or anchored.

Once we decided to try ownership and use of this kind of boat, and experience the sport of wake surfing, we found this to be even more true. I credit much of this to the wake surf boat sellers, and in particular Minnesota Inboard from whom we purchased our boat. Even though they understood that we had lived on the lake for more than a decade and had thousands of hours of experience operating boats on Minnetonka and elsewhere, they spent a great deal of time explaining the physics of wake surf boats, how the wakes behind them travel through the water, and proper operation and etiquette and rule compliance near shores, in bays, around other boats, and around other forms of recreation (fishing, paddle boarding, kayaking, canoeing, etc.). They stress to each new owner the need to be particularly conscientious to make sure that all enjoy the lake with as little reasonable disruption to one another. Since the time of our boat purchase, we have worked with MN Inboard and others on the lake to teach ourselves, our children, and our family members and friends how to surf and how to operate our boat in a manner that complies with rules and which is respectful of our neighbors and others who are on the water. When we are on the water, or on or near our dock, I have experienced the same courtesy from nearly every other wake surf (or wake board/ski) boat and boat operator with whom we interact.

All of that said, at times, we have experienced water craft operation that has been extraordinarily disruptive to our enjoyment of swimming, floating, etc. on our own shoreline and while anchored in many bays on the lake. We have likewise observed and had close calls with dangerous, disrespectful and inappropriate watercraft operation that have caused wakes disruptive to boats that are anchored, docks and shoreline enjoyment. This has not been limited to any specific boat type or recreational activity. The change in watercraft manufacture, and in particular the advent of powerful "tower" speakers, has also driven an increase in watercraft music levels that can, at times, be extraordinary

disruptive to homeowners on the lake in the evening and at night. We can share from firsthand experience that these activities are not led by, driven by or predominantly caused by wake surf boats or their operators. Much of the wake disruption we have experienced has been caused by larger, wider-beamed boats operated between cruising and planed-out speeds (i.e. "plowing"). This is likewise true of many types of boats (deck, cabin cruiser and others) pulling kids on tubes and creating large waves for the tube to jump. The same is true of larger boats creating a wake for jet ski operators to jump. And the same true for large boat operators who simply choose to plow along at 15 mph regardless of the wake they cast because they neither want to plane out nor cruse along at only 6 mpg. I have seen the studies that imply cruiser boats only cause these larger wakes for the limited time of accelerating to plane, but I can tell you with certainty living on Lafayette Bay, and spending plenty of time on Lower Lake, Upper Lake, and Crystal Bay, that it is more than common to see cruisers plowing along at 10-15 mph and casting as large or larger wakes then a surf boat, for longer period of time in more dense boat traffic. We can say from our own experience that, when "plowing," our former Sea Ray cast just as high a wake as our Malibu does in surf mode.

We have also frequently seen various types of boats come far too close to our dock or our anchored boat at unreasonable speeds and casting a disruptive wakes—but rarely if ever a wake surf boat with a surfer behind. Relative to the sound issues, many cabin and deck boats now have "tower" speakers and high output marine speakers installed that can drive music volume levels that are far too loud. Those, which have been disruptive particularly in the evening and at night, have tended to be larger cabin boats with a large number of occupants. We have also experienced large wakes and dangerous operation resulting from individual operators who may not own the boat they are operating and simply do not know (or do not care) about the rules, regulations or etiquette.

We have also, of course, been disturbed by wake surf boats and their operators who have not followed rules, who have not exercised appropriate etiquette, and who have operated their sound systems and disruptive and unreasonable levels. But those have certainly not been the majority, and our observations and experiences of improper boat operation, lack of etiquette, and experiences with lake shore and boat disruption due to large boat waves have been caused by all kinds of boats—not wake surf boats specifically. Any boat operator on a boat with sufficient draw and beam, and with a sufficiently loud audio equipment, can cause disrupt the enjoyment for and cause negative experiences to others who live on and use the lake. Whether it is a lake shore owner, someone who brings their own boat to the lake via a launch, marina renter or boat club member, it has been our experience by far that it is the individual operator not the specific boat or recreational activity.

The bottom line of what I am trying to say is that the encouragement and, if needed, enforcement of existing boat operating rules (including the existing 150 slow/no wake requirements), use of the "Own Your Wake" initiative, continued efforts by industry participants such as the surf boat sellers to encourage education and compliance with existing rules as well as additional voluntary "rules" of etiquette expected by operators of recreational boats should be the focus of all involved. This is consistent with the stated mission and authority of the LMCD. Additional rules and regulations focused on one recreation and one type of boat, in our viewpoint, are not. Below are our thoughts on the options stated as potential proposed ordinances listed in the LMCD June 2, 2022 Update:

- a. Distance from shore that boats must operate at low wake -- I believe the current rules on this point suffice when observed and enforced.
- b. Whether this distance should be the same for different types of boats I do not believe it would be fair or appropriate under the LMCD mission to single out any particular type of boat or activity as subject to different rules. Distance is measurable, and low wake is low wake, regardless of the watercraft.
- c. Whether certain smaller bays should have different restrictions than larger bays –Same comment as above, with the addition that restricting smaller bays simply has the effect of privatizing those bays to those who live on them, and pushing more traffic onto the larger bays. This, in effect, prioritizes owners on certain bays over others and can have further significant unintended consequences.
- d. Whether there should be restricted hours or days for some recreational boating activities Again, this would be single out specific boating activities and prefer one type over another. For instance, if we are concerned about wakes, any regulation would need to be applied equitably. Why would a wake surf boat be precluded from casting a wake when a deck boat or a large, wide-beamed cruiser is not. If wakes are the issue, then any

new regulation would need to be applied to all. To that end, on the noise issue, noise level restrictions applied to all water craft audio systems during specified hours would be welcomed in my mind as a lake home owner.

e. Other? – As stated above, Lake Minnetonka already has additional rules and regulations that are not required on other lakes (spotter rules for towed activities, for instance). The existing rules and regulations related to distances from shore, docks, boats, divers, etc., if followed and respected by operators, are sufficient. Perhaps boat operation education and/or permitting requirements for any individual operating a watercraft on the Lake Minnetonka would make sense, though the cost of implementation and enforcement would likely be preclusive.

The issue here relates to individual boat operators and lake shore owners ensuring rule compliance, respect and etiquette. The best course for the LMCD is to work with boat sellers, boat owners, and lake shore owners to encourage cooperation and understanding, including that this is a busy lake, that this is a recreational lake, and that the waters are not privately held by those owning property on certain bays or areas. At the same time, boat operators, particularly those engaging in recreational activities such as tubing, jet skiing, wake boarding, skiing, wake surfing, and even fishing or anchoring and listening to music, all have an obligation to think, observe, and be conscientious toward other operators and lake shore owners.

Thank you for your consideration and work to keep Lake Minnetonka safe and available for all of us.

My name is Joe Lynch and I currently live on Lake Minnetonka. I have been using my family's wake surfing boat on the lake for the past 3 years. During my time on the lake, I have never once received a complaint for any reckless behavior including being too close to the shore, playing music too loud, or completing repetitive passes while wake surfing. I have noticed that the number one used boat are surf boats. I constantly see people enjoying their time while respecting the rules that have been put in place for surf boats. I understand the small group's opinion that these boats can be detrimental to the shore, however the effects of banning wake surfing boats on the lake would be far greater. According to boattrader.com, Minnesota collects the tenth most revenue out of all states from boating. Due to our high number of lakes and shoreline, Minnesota has found a way to crack the top 10 besides having nearly half the amount of time to use a boat compared to rivalry states. Wake surfing boats are one of the more commonly used boats on the lake, and just from an eye test, I would say that they are the most popular. Banning wake boats would ultimately lead to a far less influx of people towards our lake. People in cities that are near/on Lake Minnetonka would no longer use our lake as there are 10,000 other lakes to choose from. My name is Brandon Grady and my wife and I live on Lake Minnetonka and own a wakesurfing boat. I would like to provide my input on this topic as it very much affects our day to day in the summer. We specifically bought our home to have the ability to wakesurf, it's a great sport that's low impact and fun for almost all ages. The wakes themselves are not a new issue to Lake Minnetonka, the large 30' plus boats put out incredibly large wakes as well and have been on this water for many many years. I believe the nuisance factor is the largest issue we're facing today and I'm in support of mitigating that.

There are an incredibly large number of boat drivers on this lake, particularly on the weekends that do not obey rules, are unsafe, and are the main reason we are seeing so much damage to our lake. I believe the 200' rule is more than adequate and there are studies to support that, but I do not believe that rule is followed very closely. I am fully in support of better regulation and am even more in support of a better education system for boaters. We do not even use our boat from 11am to 6pm on the weekends as we've deemed it too unsafe. That is largely due to the number of boats, the number of uneducated drivers, and the amount of alcohol consumed at places like Big Island.

Property value is also another huge consideration, when we chose which lake to purchase our home on, the amount of regulation on boating clearly weighed heavily on home values. The more restrictions, the less valuable the property. Absolutely no one wins when property values decline.

I think we need to make access to this lake more difficult for individuals who are not educated. That will likely lower the overall number of waves to be concerned with in general and will likely keep the waves produced at a minimum of 200' away from the shore. The residents of this lake have much more to lose than those who drop in from time to time to use it.
