My husband and I live on Forest Lake Bay in Orono and we strongly oppose any wake restrictions. It feels unnecessarily punitive to wake boat owners. Reducing one preferred type of recreation over another type of recreation is discriminatory and favoring one vocal minority of the lake users who want to limit wake-surfing boat .

Additionally, claiming it is damaging to the lakeshore is entirely unfounded on Lake Minnetonka. Until environmental studies have been done on the impact of wake boat generated waves on Lake Minnetonka have been done, it feels like a rush to judgement to claim there is a massive environmental impact. The unrelenting wind generated waves crashing on the lakeshore are much more of a worry for lakeshore erosion then the occasional surf boat generated wave.

This rush to judgement is going to have a negative economic impact on the lake as well. Lakeshore values will go down when residents and future residents start seeking out other lakes so they can enjoy their preferred method of recreation.

It would be one thing if the entire state of MN was considering wake restrictions and imposing them on ALL lakes because it would not be punitive to Lake Minnetonka residents and users. But, by the LMCD targeting Minnetonka and making it harder to recreate on- you are putting the residents and visitors at a massive disadvantage. Proposed Rule Change to 300 Feet

I would like to comment on the current topic of changing the 'no wake' distance from 150 to 300 feet from shore or anchored boats. The current buffer of 150 ft is not uniformly enforced and doubling the buffer isn't going to measurably protect the shoreline any more than the current regulation. I don't generally see surf boats buzzing the shore. We live in Excelsior near Frog Island and routinely see boats treating the navigation channels like a racecourse. The channel West of Frog is defined by the shoreline on the East side where boats are less than 20 feet from shore. The channel near 454 Lafayette is within 50 feet of the shoreline and people race through there on a regular basis. Our experience in other areas of the lake makes it clear the education is lacking versus the regulation. Common courtesy and education should prevail versus more regulation that can't be consistently enforced.

I understand the studies were driven by the impact of surf boats. Gideon's Bay is a popular spot for the boats and there can be several people surfing or tubing on any given day. They are not going close to shore in my experience. Anyone with a surf boat on the lake has to be aware of the concern and is generally well away from others. A 300 foot rule to an anchored boat it will effectively make a place like St. Alban's no wake with just a few boats anchored. The issue has been boats coming much closer than 150 ft and the rule not being enforced.

A change like this is unnecessary for the majority of boaters. A pleasure boater needing to be less than 5 MPH 200 ft from an anchored boat is not necessary. I don't recall hearing law enforcement asking for this rule because they don't have the tools to keep people safer today. While this proposed change may count as a response to recent noise, it does nothing to address educating those who are not familiar with the issues or current regulations. This becomes another unique and unnecessary Lake Minnetonka rule that will be hard to enforce.

Educate, enforce what is currently in place and continue to work with surf boaters to constructively support use of the lake by everyone.

I am strongly opposing the newLu proposed 300 foot setback.

Moving the setback from 150 feet to 300 feet will create congestion, bottlenecking and Pinchpoints around the lake.

This lake is known throughout the state and the country for its extraordinary shoreline with multiple quaint towns, shopping and restaurants and its super fun boat scene. 

Please add my voice to those strongly OPPOSING the proposed new ordinance placing a five-miles-per-hour speed limit on boats within 300 feet of shorelines, beaches, docs, anchored boats and swimmers. I am very concerned that there could be numerous unintended consequences and increasing enforcement of the existing regulations would be a better solution.

I am extremely concerned that some popular bays such as Maxwell Bay, Stubbs Bay, North Arm Bay and Halsted Bay could become much more restricted which would increase the use of other parts of the lake and the larger bays for watersports. Those other parts of the lake are already very congested with boat traffic and increasing the congestion on those parts of the lake would be extremely dangerous for boaters, waverunners/jet skiers and especially people participating in water sports. Spreading out the boat traffic over the entire lake rather than concentrating it on a few parts of the lake is much safer and provides a better experience for everyone.

I feel that the proposed 300' buffer is excessive and will render too much of the lake unusable by those users that do not pose the risk to the shoreline, such as slalom skiers, jet skiers, and fishermen. I'd endorse the Water Sports Industry Association (WSIA) guidelines of 200 ft.

LMCD,

For my entire life, I have been lucky to enjoy Lake Minnetonka and all it has to offer, but I worry that if the proposed minimum wage extension from 150 feet to 300 feet is passed, the enjoyment of the lake will be threatened.

This proposed rule inconveniences everyone on the lake, instead of a targeted rule only forcing wake surf boats further out, which could make sense, as long as the practice is not banned altogether on the lake. This proposal will extend minimum wake areas on the lake around channels, and create new minimum wake areas around the lake, inconveniencing boat drivers by adding time to trips around the lake.

In my opinion, the most ill-conceived part of this ordinance is the part that forces boat drivers to a minimum wake within 300 feet of an anchored boat. This will have the affect of shutting down entire bays to boating recreation if one boat is sitting in the middle, with a diameter of 600 feet of a minimum wake zone in the middle of the bay.

This will also increase enforcement action against boaters on the lake, inconveniencing boaters with unnecessary criminal penalties/fines for doing something that they may not even know was illegal, since every other recreational lake in the state has no such rule. This rule is also very subjective in it's enforcement since boaters and law enforcement do not carry measuring devices and use them while boating. It is hard to judge arbitrary distances on the water.

To the point of reducing erosion, nearly all of the lake is surrounded by riprap so erosion is not a major concern, in my opinion.

I strongly persuade the LMCD to abandon this proposal.

I oppose the change to the Boat-Generated Wakes rule

To Whom it may concern;

I have reviewed the proposal to increase the no-wake area to 300' from any shore, and I oppose its adoption.

It will constrict many busy waterways within Lake Minnetonka causing congestion, and increasing the risk of collision. It will also make many parts of the lake nearly unnavigable because of long distances, and congestion caused by the nowake zone. In my opinion, this rule will harm users of the lake more than help them.

In my experience, the wake issues on Minnetonka are not caused by 'normal' boats traversing too close to shore, but instead by boats of unreasonable size for the lake, and wakeboard boats that travel with their ballast tanks continuously full. This rule change will endanger and inconvenience thousands of regular users of the lake without truly addressing the source of excessive wakes.

Suggested alternatives:

- * Install the new 300' rule for boats over a certain length, and/or wakeboard boats with full ballast tanks.
- * Limit the days and hours that wakeboarding can occur on Lake Minnetonka. There is a similar limit on personal watercraft on portions of the St. Croix river, which has worked very well.
- * Limit the size of a boat acceptable on the lake.
- * Limit large boats and/or wakeboard boats to certain areas of the lake.
- * Limit the speed of very large boats
- * Prohibit boats over a certain size from traveling abreast
- * Limit wakeboarding to areas of the lake at least 10' deep and 200' from shore as recommended by the university study.
- * Prohibit wakeboard boats from operating with full ballast tanks when not actively wakeboarding.

I am writing to express our concerns about the shoreline and enjoyment of the lake for all. I would like to support some type of restrictions placed on maximum wake that is produced from wake surfing. We live in Halsteads Bay and expierence problems when wake surfers and boats drive with maximum wake close to our dock. Although the minimum distance is currently 150 feet, often boaters are only 30 feet from our dock (even when we are swimming). This causes concern for our safety and that of theirs. We live across from Kings point and next to Cardinal cove. The distance from our shoreline to Kings point is not more than 200 yards. This causes issues when people try to surf, tube ski and cruise while lots of boats are coming and going from the Halsteads landing. Unfortunately they avoid going in the middle of the bay and end up being 30 to 50 feet from our dock.

The maximum wake created from wake surfing is problematic for the shoreline. Some boats don't put out much of a wake even when driving fast. So the new restrictions should only effect those types and size boats. The faster speed on some boats puts out less of a wake while the wake surf boats going slow push out the water and create a large wake even while driving slow. Another consideration would be to limit the days or hours of wake surfing. Such as not allowing wake surfing on weekends when there are so many more boats and swimmers on the lake.

Like most readers, our family embraces Lake Minnetonka as a way of life. The lake, which we gladly share with so many other like-minded families, serves as the centerpiece of our social circle and family activities, in all the seasons. As a common space, we couldn't all enjoy the lake without the right mix of rules and regulations to ensure a safe and pleasurable experience while preserving the health of the lake and its surroundings. But like any ecosystem, the rules, access and formal and informal social constructs exist in a balance, a balance that the majority of the lake's residents have found to be just about right. Recently though, a loud but small contingent has been agitating for new rules, based not on science or research, but personal predilections. In their complaints, the group has identified wake boats as the central, singular source of problems: wake boats. Instead of jumping to an obtuse reaction, we should start by looking at their complaints and whether or not eliminating wake boats would actually solve their complaints.

The first complaint is wake size. Yes, wake boards are designed to produce a wake, but the wake formation requires ~ twenty or more feet of water depth to generate a good surfable wave. A requirement that naturally draws wake boats away from the shore. In addition, when compared to cruisers, the wake is significantly smaller and less powerful. Has any of the compaintants produced evidence that the increase in popularity of wake boats has been correlated to an increase in soil erosion? Or attempted to isolate wake boats' impact to overall increase in wake production given the overall growth in traffic?

The second complaint is noise. The operation of a wake boat and its inboard engine is not uniquely loud. We live on the West side of Crystal Bay. When people complain about the noise, we primarily hear it coming from fishing boats going full throttle from the North Arm launch to the coffee channel starting about 6:00 am most mornings from May - October. These fishing boats wake us up most mornings when our windows are open. Wouldn't a better noise solution be to ban fishing boats from sun up until 9:30 am? If the complaint about wake boat noise comes not from the boat, but from the speaker system, then we should ban people younger than 50 years old from operating a boat since youth is highly correlated with both annoying musical taste and a desire to play it loudly?

A clear threat to the lake and its habitats, as opposed to the recent complaints, is foreign AIS species. Should we close all the public launches because it appears that most AIS species are coming from transient boats, which would cut down on aggregate boat traffic?

Even "balanced" proposals are problematic. Other people have discussed only surfing only certain days. Would this lead to only cruisers being only to operate on certain days also? How would our local marinas and restaurants feel about this? (Cove/Maynard/Fletchers)?

To be clear, I support all types of boating and not new regulations. These conversations appear to be driven by a tiny minority. Education and communication are essential, not additional regulations.

My name is Ed Rockwell and I live at 4888 Edgewater Dr, Mound, MN 55364 on the south shore of Harrisons Bay.

We have lived at our house for 22 years.

The recent uprise of wake boats (within the last 5-10 years) has been horrible for our shoreline, dock, boats tied to dock and enjoyment of the lake. We have received damage on our boat because of the 2-3 foot wake boat waves rolling in most of the day on weekends and throughout the day on weekdays.

These boats not only do harm to the shoreline and property, they also put huge amounts of pressure under the boats and harm the bottom of the lake. Our bay is on average of only 15 feet deep. Most of the bay is around 10 feet and only ONE SMALL area where it is 30 feet. 300 ft rule change feedback

We would like to share a few thoughts about the new proposed restrictions on Lake Minnetonka. Let us first start by saying we are on the lake every day, and we just don't see people abusing the 200 ft guidance that is currently in place.

Problems with the recent University of MN test on Lake Independence:

The study used two different types and sizes of boats and ran them at different speeds with a different number of people in them, so this inconsistency makes the study flawed from the beginning. The testers lacked an understanding of how to use the wakeboat and at what speeds they typically run. The criteria they used for their study just doesn't make sense.

The proposed idea that boaters will need to stay 300 ft away from an anchored boat is not realistic. Very frequently we will be out surfing on a busy part of the lake and a fisherman or other boater will come and anchor right in our path. Then they get mad if their boat gets rocked a little. It just isn't fair to blame the wakeboat. Everyone needs to take responsibility. If someone wants to anchor their boat, they should go find a quiet spot out of the way to do so.

Adding more restrictions will have an economic impact. If you look up and down the shoreline, a very large percentage of homes have wakeboats. If you start restricting boats you can watch your property values tank. Lake Minnetonka is a fully recreational lake and the bulk of the shoreline has been fortified with boulders. Everyone who moves to Lake Minnetonka knows that it is a busy lake.

99% of the time, we stay way more than 300 ft from shore, and I believe the majority of other boaters do as well. But there are times when we are forced to change our course because someone cuts us off, parks in our way, etc. If this occurs, we should not be considered the ones at fault when we are pulling a skier and have the right of way.

I don't think most people realize exactly how far 200 ft or 300 feet actually is. Increased education would be more helpful than imposing more restrictions. The new bouy on Cooks bay indicating the 150 and 300 ft distance is a great example of this and it is very helpful.

In smaller bays the 300 ft rule would actually force more boats into a smaller area. This will dramatically increase the chance of an accident, especially when participating in water sports.

Thank you for taking these points into consideration.

Update Regarding Boat Generated Wakes Review and Draft Code Amendment

LMCD Board -

I'm writing in regards to the proposed ordinance of five-miles-per-hour speed limit on all boats within 300 feet of shorelines, beaches, docks, anchored boats and swimmers. I think this increase would create a lake of boats driving 5 mph during evenings and weekends in all bays with the exception of the Upper, main and lower parts of Lake Minnetonka which can accommodate multiple boats. However, no one is using the main part of Lake Minnetonka for recreational activities due to the size of waves created by wind and boats.

This proposed ordinance basically forces all bays into no wake bays when multiple boats are out. The 300 ft setback limits the area any boat can maneuver for water sport activities. I'm in favor of increasing the setback to 200ft from shorelines, beaches, docks and swimmers. However, restricting boats to 300ft setbacks truly limits the space for water sport activities. Additionally - there should not be a change to anchored boats or fishing boats.

Imagine a family is out boating (tubing, water skiing, wakeboarding) in a bay, then another boat comes along and drops anchor within 300ft or starts fishing. This ordinance would favor the boat who came into the bay and decided to drop anchor or fishing over the existing boat already enjoying the lake. The ordinance should not favor one family over another. The ordinance should not include fishing boats or anchored boats. Keeping the 150ft setback for these would be sufficient to maintain a balance.

Lake Minnetonka should provide equal balance to all boaters, creating additional restrictions is not practical, fair or just.

To The Lake Minnetonka Conservation District,

I love Lake Minnetonka and all it has to offer the people who enjoy it, and the last thing I want is it to be ruined. That's why I'm vehemently opposed to the proposal of the New Ordinance that would place a 5mph speed limit on all boats within 300ft of shorelines, beaches, docks, anchored boats, and swimmers without seeing any empirical data that supports this addition 150ft of space will resolve the issue.

In the absence of this empirical data, it feels like the only thing this policy will be destroying is the recreation that the citizens of Lake Minnetonka and its visitors enjoy.

As the law stands today, I find it difficult to understand where 150ft is without it feeling arbitrary. Is the LMCD going to provide guidance and/or add additional markers to the lake so it's clear where this line begins and ends?

Secondly, if every other lake in Minnesota doesn't have this issue on their lake, then I find it hard to believe Lake Minnetonka has this issue.

I also find it absurd that a boat generated wake does any extensive damage to shorelines, especially when most those shorelines have been modified with rock landscaping. The consistent natural waves that are created, everyday all day, by wind and nature don't even seen to have much of an effect on these shorelines. I am open to implementing solutions if the empirical data shows that without a doubt the ordinance will resolve the issues.

My questions to you?

- 1. How does one measure 150ft or 300ft on a body of water while in a boat?
- 2. How can you be certain that someone is violating this rule without have markers placed all around the lakes shoreline? Arbitrarily ticketing people seems wrong, and authoritarian to me.
- 3. What is the scientific evidence that this additional 150ft will resolve this issue? What what is the scientific evidence that boat generated wakes have caused any harm?

My Lake Minnetonka Experience:

I average 4 out of 7 days per week for the last 6 years on Lake Minnetonka. Most of the time the majority of these bays are pretty much empty. Even on busy days, there is always a bay you can move to if escaping the crowds is what you desire.

I only have a 20ft boat, and some paddleboards... I am one of these smaller vessels on the lake that have to learn to play along side these larger vessels. Lake Minnetonka is a very large lake and any vessel that enters it's waters should be aware of the possible dangers that a lake of this size can generate, both man made and natural. It would be asinine to enter the ocean on a kayak and be upset at the naturally large waves and the larger "safer" vessels people choose to use to navigate these waters.

Hello,

I have read the proposed ordinance change. As someone who has been boating for 45 years and as a lake shore owner, I find the proposed distance in the ordinance change to be extreme. I believe it will be more difficult to enforce, cause more animosity among boaters, lake shore owners and neighbors as we all have a different perspective of what 300 feet distance looks like.

The proposed ordinance will also cause more issues due to the ambiguity of rules surrounding anchored rafts or moored watercraft. The way the ordinance is proposed is likely to cause an additional surge of lake shore owners to put out floating rafts of any type just to push boat traffic further out in the lake. Is there a maximum distance a lake shore owner can put a raft out from shore? The same is true of remotely anchoring / mooring a sailboat or other watercraft in front of a lake shore owners property. This appears to be a significant hole in the proposed ordinance.

What has the input from enforcement teams (Sheriff's team and DNR) been on how to more effectively enforce the existing ordinance? What is their input on the proposed 300 foot ordinance? To expect people to keep a football fields distance from the shoreline and all objects noted if going over 5 m.p.h. seems unrealistic.



On behalf of the recreational boating industry and partners, thank you for your stewardship of Lake Minnetonka and surrounding communities.

By way of background, the Marine Retailers Association of the Americas (MRAA) is the leading trade association of North American small businesses that sell and service new and pre-owned recreational boats and operate marinas, boatyards, and accessory stores. MRAA represents more than 1000 individual member retail locations throughout the United States. The National Marine Manufacturers Association (NMMA) is the largest trade association for the recreational boating industry, representing nearly 1,300 marine businesses, including recreational boat, marine engine and accessory manufacturers. The Water Sports Industry Association (WSIA) is the towed water sport's industry's leading advocate. WSIA develops best practices, maintains waterway access rights, educates participants, promotes safety, and more.

In the state of Minnesota, the recreational boating industry contributes \$3.1 billion in economic impact, supporting more than 10,900 jobs and 700 businesses. Regarding the upcoming July 27, 2022 Board Meeting and draft ordinance titled, "An Ordinance Amending Watercraft And Personal Watercraft Speed Limits Under The Lake Minnetonka Conservation District Code Of Ordinances", we do not support the proposed 300 foot setback from shorelines and structures for all boats as drafted.

Based on recent research, wakes from boats do not degrade shorelines and structures when operated at a distance of 200 feet. According to a report from the University of Minnesota's St. Anthony Falls Laboratory titled *Quantifying Wave Energy on Minnesota Lakes*, "shoreline erosion is driven mainly by wind-generated wave energy," not wakes from boats.

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) through its "Own Your Wake" campaign indicates "by staying at least 200 feet from shore or other structures boaters can reduce the likelihood their wakes will cause damage." NMMA supports the DNR's "Own Your Wake"







campaign and encourages the LMCD to continue supporting the DNR campaign and efforts by adopting its recommended 200 foot setback from shorelines and structures.

We recognize the LMCD Board has a responsibility to collect comments from all stakeholders and balance the needs of the community. We encourage the LMCD to carefully weigh the impacts of ordinances on the boating community as a whole and to seek direct conversation with businesses operating on Lake Minnetonka.

Hello. My wife Joy and I live at 3342 Robinson Bay Road in Deephaven (technically Wayzata). Our house is beachfront on Robinson Bay. We actively enjoy accessing the lake for swimming, sailing, stand-up paddleboarding and power boating – including wake-surfing.

We are opposed to the proposed setback increase. Our observation is that power boats in general, and wakesurf boats in particular, are respectful of our bay and do not come too close to shore. The sheltered nature of the bay attracts a large number of boaters who anchor for good parts of the day and/or evening. There are occasional times when a boat will be blasting music but in general folks are very well-behaved.

If there is a problem with wave generation too close to shore, I would recommend enforcement of the existing 150' distance regulation. It will make no difference if the setback is increased to 300' if it is not enforced either, and it will end up being one more regulation imposed on the general boating public to deal with the few inconsiderate bad apples. For what it's worth, we NEVER see a water patrol or sheriff boat on the lake these days.

Vickie, I also wanted to add that even though the current 150ft limit is insufficient today the wake surfers do not currently abide by this rule now . When there is one or two boats wake surfing they will start in the middle of the bay but as more boats add to the mix they push closer and closer to shore, often operating around 100-120 ft from the docks and much closer as they cut close to the point on the north shore of Gideons bay. The only solution property owners have is to call 911 and leave a message for the water patrol who given their small numbers and large areas to cover cannot get to the bay for generally 30 minutes or so rendering enforcement unlikely.

I also would recommend that music on all boats be limited to a volume that can be enjoyed by the boat occupants in a slow wake mode. This makes it enjoyable for all boat and property owners to enjoy the music of their choice on their boat or on their property.

Vickie, this is a great first step in the right direction. It will be helpful and appreciate that we are getting something done now. The problems have been well documented and the science conducted around the nation's lakes have been well documented regarding environmental damage caused by wake surf boats operating in the wake surf mode.

My biggest concern is that this amendment to the existing !50 ft rule will be seen as a final solution to all the issues; it is not. This is a start and a band aide. It does not address the science and the damage, it rather treats all the issues as just nuisances.

To review:

Wake surfing drives out all other water activities in the bay- it imposes its will on all others. One person who spoke at the last meeting said it well: you just have to leave the area when they are surfing.

We need time constraints on wake surfing activity like we do with jet skis. You cannot jet ski before 9:30 or later than one hour before sunset yet you can wake surf until ½ hour after sunset. This provides zero relief to all other activities

trying to find time to enjoy some peace and quiet. I suggest we implement time limits where boats can still operate, just not in wake surf mode: example would be say every other day or not before 10AM or after 6pm.

300 ft does not follow the science. We need 500-700 ft distance and at least 30 ft of depth to reduce environmental damage. Wake surf mode directs prop wash downward, unlike all other boating activities that direct the wake horizontally. This stirs up and disrupts the bottom, releasing phosphorus and pushes the silt towards shore. This issues has to be addressed. I have the figures now on dredging. In our neighborhood association we have a collection of twelve docs. In 2010 they dredged the first 4 slips at a cost of \$10,000. In 2017 they did it again for the same cost. It needed to be done now in 2021 but waited till winter of 2022 or 5 years , the same 4 slips cost \$19,000 as there are now costly regulations on where and how you can dispose of this waste. So the frequency and cost to dredge due to wake surf waves pushing the bottom to the shore is becoming a very costly endeavor to home owners.

We are not dealing with vey loud noise which consistently rates as a top nuisance. Large speakers are mounted behind the driver on towers and are turned up high to overcome the loud roar of the engine, especially run in the low rpm mode. So they crank up the volume to be able to hear it. Unfortunately water is a perfect medium to efficiently transfer sound. I would love to be able to open my windows and doors to fresh air but you simply cannot due to loud pounding music. The current ordinance has no teeth. I suggest that we have certain times, again before 10am or after 6 where music is reduced to what can be consumed in a slow moving vessel.

We have implemented quiet waters and slow buoys around the lake to minimize the disruption waves cause in high traffic areas. Well, the shorelines in the bays have now become high traffic areas and deserve the same consideration.

I believe there are simple solutions that exist as I have suggested above. Wake surfing as an activity can easily be moved to deeper waters farther from shore without impeding the sport. Limiting their hours of operation like we do with jet skis will allow others to enjoy the bays as well.

700 ft and 30 ft depth will reduce the need to dredge, will not disrupt the bottom or release damaging phosphorus into the water and will protect our shorelines from erosion.

Thank you to the LMCD for taking early action. But I feel there is more to do to reduce the damage to a more acceptable level.

Hello,

The Lake Minnetonka Conservation District (LMCD) has heard from many community members that the large wakes created by boats near the lake's shoreline make it difficult for people using small watercraft to enjoy the lake. In addition, these wakes can be harmful to people, damage property, hurt the environment, and contribute to shoreline erosion. We have also heard from community members who believe all boats have a place on Lake Minnetonka.

Lake Minnetonka is important to many people, and we are committed to preserving it and ensuring everyone can enjoy the lake safely. After listening to community concerns and conducting our own review, one step the LMCD board is considering is updating the rule to limit boat-generated wakes near the shore, structures, and people.

The new ordinance would place a five-miles-per-hour speed limit on all boats within 300 feet of shorelines, beaches, docks, anchored boats and swimmers. This would be an increase from the current 150-foot distance rule. A draft of the new ordinance is available for review on our webpage Safety & Boat Generated Wakes and directly at this LINK, along with a brief summary of the draft code amendment at this LINK. LMCD Board Members,

As a board member of the Lotus Lake Conservation Alliance (LLCA) in Chanhassen, I understand what you go through on a regular basis. You volunteer your time to protect Lake Minnetonka, and you constantly hear arguments on both sides of the wake issue. You want the lake to be safe and usable for everyone - and you want to ensure that the decisions you make are fair for all parties.

The decision you are considering this week goes beyond the shores of Lake Minnetonka. Greater Minnesota naturally looks to you, and the decisions you make, as a precedent for other lakes. As someone who frequently enjoys visiting Lake Minnetonka, and on behalf of all motorized lakes across Minnesota, I strongly urge you NOT to pass this new ordinance. Despite numerous attempts on the subject, there is still no direct evidence of boat-generated wakes damaging property, hurting the environment or contributing to shoreline erosion any more or less than the last big storm to come through. Both sides can skew the results of recent studies in any direction that serves their purpose. Thanks to confirmation bias, residents who oppose motorized watersports FEEL these things are true and speak their concerns, and they are free to do so. Some of you, as members of this board, very likely *feel* this way as well. We have no right to question your opinion. It's yours. However, claiming there is scientific evidence to back this opinion is not valid. Sending notice of this meeting and ordinance consideration to residents and stating in the introductory paragraph that boat-generated wakes cause damage to property is biased. Two years ago previous LLCA board members made the same mistake, misrepresenting residents at City Hall, and several of them are no longer on the board today as a result of the public backlash. Your *opinion* should not be something upon which you can base a blanket decision such as this, especially when it has the potential to affect so many lives across Minnesota.

Imagine living on a golf course and being told one day that you are no longer allowed to use your driver on certain holes because some residents are tired of seeing golf balls in their backyard. Despite having moved to a golf course, these residents believe they can complain enough to change the course rules to something more desirable for their personal activities. This is what this conversation is like for watersport aficionados on Lake Minnetonka. Supporters of this ordinance knew the rules (and limitations) of the lake when they moved in - and now want to change those rules for their own personal benefit - despite the hardship and disruption they will create for others. Thousands of Lake Minnetonka residents moved to the shores of your lake to pursue their passion for watersports, and they can (and will) be as loud as the voices currently in your ears trying to shut them down. Thousands more live on lakes across Minnesota that could be changed forever if the implications of your decisions are taken myopically.

Hello LMCD counsel,

I understand that there are things that need to be managed on our lake to keep it safe and enjoyable. I am concerned this new proposed wake ordinance will make it almost impossible to do any recreation activities in so many areas of our lake. Lake Minnetonka has so many smaller inlets and bays vs a big open area of water. You will essentially shut off large areas of most of the lake to any sports like waterskiing, tubing, wakeboarding, wake surfing. So many areas look like they may be big enough, but have hazard buoys so that it won't be usable with the 300 ft new rule and 5 mph.

I live on the lake. Everyone has a right to use the lake and enjoy it in whatever type of recreation they like to do. I see the waves made by all kinds of boats and they are all large and impactful. It is definitely not just the surf boats. The wave generation on my bay with people tubing exceeds that made by a wake boat. The same goes for cruiser boats that are like ocean vessels 32 feet and above. I am sure if these other boats and their waves were studied they would find equal or more damage and velocity.

One thing that has not been addressed is the loud music issue. I am a wake surfer. I live on the lake. The tower speakers need to be banned. I'm sorry, but the loud music has to stop. If all boats had tower speakers can you imagine? There is just no need. Sorry surfers, you can hear the music when you get back in the boat. To me, this has been a big issue for homeowners and others that are trying to relax at this time on our lake. Vickie,

I am writing to you in opposition to the proposed rule change seeking to increase the distance of the 5 MPH speed limit from 150 feet to 300 feet from shorelines, beaches, docks, anchored boats, and swimmers. Lake Minnetonka is a large recreational lake near highly populated areas, providing a great opportunity for many people throughout the area to enjoy water sports (skiing, wakeboarding, wake surfing etc.), fishing, general boating (towing tubes, sightseeing, etc.) and personal watercraft use (i.e. jet skis). Even so, there are many parts of the lake already reserved and dedicated as "quite waters / slow areas" to accommodate those that like to anchor, paddle, play and enjoy the lake without a lot of waves. My family and I enjoy water sports and also anchoring in the many quite waters areas on the Lake. Increasing the distance from 150 feet to 300 feet to enjoy the active recreational activities available on the Lake seems unnecessarily burdensome upon those looking to enjoy those activities. Furthermore, having to reduce speeds to under 5 MPH 300 feet from any anchored boats/swimmers seems highly unfair to water sports enthusiasts as there are already many protected places for boats to anchor and people to swim without the worry of boats buzzing by them. 150 feet from every shoreline is a lot of square footage in and of itself!, not including an arbitrary 150 foot circle around boats anchored randomly offshore. Such a rule change would inevitably render entire bays inaccessible to water sports as a handful of boats could choose to anchor in a way that makes using the Lake for these water sports impossible. This is not the right balance for sharing this great resource with the broader community and all the varied interests.

Moreover, this rule seems to be aimed at placating a more narrow view of the Lake's intended uses and I think a better rule could be developed than the seemingly arbitrary rule being proposed. We are not against protecting the lake from erosion, people from harm and property from damage, but this rule is overly punitive to the more active recreational users of the Lake. For the safety of people and boaters alike, the LMCD should look into protecting recreational swimmers and anchored boats by incentivizing those boats to anchor in the already designated calm waters and shoreline buffer zones against vessels traveling above 5 MPH. One way to do this would be by expanding the shoreline restriction from the current 150 feet to somewhere between 150-300 feet (300 feet seems excessive – 200-250 seems more reasonable) and maintaining or even reducing the operating buffer for anchored vessels outside of these zones to between 100 and 150 feet. Something like this vastly expands the area of the Lake for smaller watercraft, swimmers and anchored boats, is more protective of the shoreline, yet still allows for the Lake to be used by those that enjoy the more active water sports. Again, I am not proposing this as "the answer" but its directionally a better proposal than the current one. Thank you.

LMCD board and staff,

I own a home on Maxwell Bay and another home on North Arm Bay. I write to express my opposition to this proposed rule. I am opposed to this rule on several grounds.

First, 300 feet from any other boat, dock, swimmer or other object on the lake will render smaller bays, like Maxwell, North Arm and Stubbs, unusable for tubing, surfing, skiing or recreational activity unless there are almost no other boaters on the bay. Realistically speaking, it would make going more than 5 mph on these bays, other than in the slowest of times, not possible. This may be exactly what a few of the noisy individuals who live on my street want, but they don't own the lake. The lake is a public good, not proprietary exclusively to ornery property owners who hate wake boats. Lake Minnetonka is a recreational lake that is situated in a large metro area. The notion that we should try to turn back the clock and make it into a calm up north style lake is not workable (unless you also plan to shut down all the public boat launches). As a user of the lake for boating, tubing, swimming, surfing, kayaking and fishing, I know that there are certain times when those activities are harder to accomplish and other times when the lake is perfect for each one. I don't ask my neighbors and fellow lake goers to adjust their use to permit me to do what I want when I want. The folks behind this rule change would be well advised to take the same approach rather than to jam a completely unworkable rule on others to be able to use the lake exactly as they wish all the time.

Second, the 150 foot rule is not enforced right now. ON any crowded day on Maxwell Bay, it is violated ad nauseum. Law enforcement can enforce a less restrictive rule (no knock on them – there are only a few of them trying to manage the lake on busy days). The idea that we would pass an even more restrictive rule that won't be enforced is an absurdity. If the LMCD really wanted to reduce density on the lake (and in my mind, that is the real issue), it would regulate how many boats can enter the lake. There are ways to do this. An annual use fee for each vessel (coupled with a very stiff penalty for violation) might help. Charging for launch access during high use periods and limiting users in those time slots (perhaps even auctioning off access at those times) would be a way to lessen density of users and enforce the annual fee requirement. Frankly these methods might also raise a little capital to assists with shoreline restoration and weed control efforts. This is a much more easily enforced alternative to an arbitrary 300 foot rule that we all know will not be enforced.

Third, concerns about shoreline erosion are a ruse. Again, Lake Minnetonka is a recreational lake surrounded by residential development in a major urban setting. Much of the lake is rip-wrapped. While the extreme naturalists might not like this, it is a sound approach for an urban recreational lake. We would be better off addressing erosion by being practical and not trying to turn Minnetonka into the BWCA – it never will be. Some of the largest wakes come off fishing boats, who have been traversing Lake Minnetonka for much longer than wake boats. The problem of large wakes is neither recent nor novel. It has been present on Lake Minnetonka for a long time. Wake boats are a whipping boy for a problem that pre-dates them.

Fourth, as a practical matter, what happens if I am going 20mph across my bay and a jet skier cuts within 200 fee of me, have I violated the new rule unless I immediately give all of my passengers whiplash? This stuff happens all the time. It is reality on the lake and not going away. The proposed rule looks like it was written by people who have an imaginary vision of what actually happens on the lake.

First of all you are basically blaming boats for shoreline erosion, there are many causes of shoreline erosion, boats, wind created waves and Ice in the winter. Most shoreline erosion is actually caused by homeowners putting grass and sand down to the beach, basically removing the natural protection that was there for millions of years before them. This basically creates the situation where any waves of any size caused by boats or wind, ice, will cause erosion. This is proven by over 80% of the shoreline has been protected and does not have erosion issues.

Secondly you are setting a precedent for all of Minnesota as Minnetonka will be looked at for their actions and there is no data that supports this new rule. The studies have shown that yes big waves cause more erosion that is not rocket science and who can argue. But what size wave is okay and what is not has not been defined and the reason is it cannot be defined as every shoreline has different resistance. Protected shorelines either naturally or manmade will not have an issue with any size wake, wave from wind or ice, whereas as stated previously sand and grass at the shoreline is susceptible to all forms of erosion, waves from boats, wind and ice. So again no science proves your solution of 5 mph solves the erosion issue as wind and ice will still cause erosion on those unprotected shorelines.

Thirdly, there are many parts of Minnetonka that a 300 ft 5 mph rule will eliminate all watersports from those areas. Homeowners purchased lots expecting to do recreational watersports and will not have to travel long distances at 5 mph to do those.

Everybody brings up safely, when I go to the ocean I have waves as they are expected and when I go to a lake waves are expected. I waterski and do that at times when there are no waves, which is about 80% of the time. So if you go to a lake and do not expect waves then you are not on the lake you should be one you should be on a pond with no boats.

Last but not least, for the shoreline owners who do not protect their shorelines, I paint my house because the sun hits it and over time the paint needs to be replaced. The same with shorelines, you buy a house on a lake. Your shoreline is being damaged because it is not protected so instead of doing what 80% of the other shoreline owners do protecting your shoreline (like painting my house) you decide not to and try to eliminate waves but you cannot eliminate waves like you cannot eliminate the sun.

So you are trying to solve a problem homeowners have caused by stopping recreational use of many parts of the lake and in the end those shorelines will still be damaged by waves caused by wind and ice.

The science does not support your solution, people protecting their shoreline will.

My name is Ed Rockwell and I live at 4888 Edgewater Dr, Mound, MN 55364 on the south shore of Harrisons Bay.

We have lived at our house for 22 years.

The recent uprise of wake boats (within the last 5-10 years) has been horrible for our shoreline, dock, boats tied to dock and enjoyment of the lake. We have received damage on our boat because of the 2-3 foot wake boat waves rolling in most of the day on weekends and throughout the day on weekdays.

These boats not only do harm to the shoreline and property, they also put huge amounts of pressure under the boats and harm the bottom of the lake. Our bay is on average of only 15 feet deep. Most of the bay is around 10 feet and only ONE SMALL area where it is 30 feet. This underwater damage to me is unknown but I'm sure you have done your research and know that these boats MUST run in larger bays where it's deep enough for them so it doesn't damage the lake bottom.

My vote is to make the distance 600 feet from shore for them to produce their wakes AND SOME BAYS they should NOT BE ALLOWED to operate. Please mention this comment in your meeting. These should NOT BE ALLOWED in Harrisons Bay. Not at all!!!

Please understand that these boats have completely changed how Harrisons Bay is enjoyed by all lakeshore owners.

I understand that this is a public lake and should be enjoyed by all. But allowing a water sport that damages the lake in ways that is catastrophic shouldn't be allowed.

I've even been hurt because I was floating by my dock and was pushed up and UNDER my dock by wake boat waves and could have been seriously injured. Once the waves arrived, it was too late to react and I had to ride it out for at least 5-6 waves.

These waves are so large that sometimes they are higher than the decking on docks. If anyone gets trapped by getting pushed under or into a dock could result in serious injury or even death.

I also have some video of these waves coming in so you can see how large they can be.

Thank you for the work you are doing on this. I've lived on North Arm bay for the last 17 years. Several years ago, we considered moving - with one of the big factors being the impact of the wake surf boats. I still remain firm that they are the only boat that impacts every other boat on the lake. The wakes are just too large, our riprap looks like it's been tossed in the air, the music is loud and I can only imagine what it's doing to the ecosystems in the bottom of our lakes.

We had friends house-sitting this weekend and even though they were experienced boaters, they weren't use to these types of waves. They were anchored near shore and the large waves sent them into the rocks, damaging their prop. They also couldn't make it out without having to walk their boat to a near-by dock to get control of the boat and make it out to a deeper area.

That said, I have seen an improvement over the last couple of years. Drivers are staying in the middle and aren't as disrespectful with the volume of their music. I can only assume that some of these improvements have come by educating these drivers, so I appreciate that.

I am definitely for regulations on these crafts, and would support your 5 mph proposal in addition to other stipulations:-). I'd still love to see certain days or times of the days were they weren't allowed in certain bays, but I know that would be hard to manage.

Again, thank you for the work you've put into this. It is ver appreciated.

The Lake Minnetonka Conservation District (LMCD) has heard from many community members that the large wakes created by boats near the lake's shoreline make it difficult for people using small watercraft to enjoy the lake. In addition, these wakes can be harmful to people, damage property, hurt the environment, and contribute to shoreline erosion. We have also heard from community members who believe all boats have a place on Lake Minnetonka.

Lake Minnetonka is important to many people, and we are committed to preserving it and ensuring everyone can enjoy the lake safely. After listening to community concerns and conducting our own review, one step the LMCD board is considering is updating the rule to limit boat-generated wakes near the shore, structures, and people.
